The Rector writes.....

Parishioners passing Holy Trinity Church in Frankfield in recent weeks, may have noticed scaffolding shrouding part of the exterior. Important maintenance to tackle a long term problem with damp, as well as potential dangers posed by a discrete if corroded and leaning chimney on the apex of the sanctuary roof, was delayed due to the Covid restrictions. At last, this work has begun. Church buildings are expensive to maintain and ironically can be more so when they are closed for worship for



considerable periods. Lack of heat and regular ventilation can cause problems!

Now as we face into the autumn period, when the health restrictions are being further reduced and we can enjoy larger numbers at our services in church, it seems a good time to reflect on the place of church buildings in the life of the Christian community and in our own personal faith. Churches are sacred spaces, places deliberately set aside by previous generations for the exclusive use of people seeking to meet with God in worship and meet others who are on a similar path in life.

In a recent sermon I posed the question, 'Is it right to spend all this money on our church buildings?' After all, in this parish we have four beautiful churches all within easy reach of each other by car. Do we need them all and do they continue to serve a purpose? In the sermon I reflected on the fact that, in terms of their art and architecture, church buildings represent the relationship between God and the people. In addition, they remind us of the importance of passing on the Christian Faith to each successive generation. That is an ever increasing and urgent challenge, but the solution lies with the importance the parents put on church involvement and the way the local parish engages with them to meet their needs. Finally, I drew attention to the fact that churches are a visible landmark, and they can be a beacon of welcome to the visitor, the curious seeker and the refugee. Holy Trinity Church in Frankfield has always been a place of welcome to those who have spent time in the Accommodation Centre on the Kinsale Road. Having a church building which is easy to find, is an important advantage over

those congregations which meet in private homes or in premises rented for use on Sunday mornings.

This fact was brought home to me at an early communion service in Blackrock recently. Attending was a man I had never met before. In conversation with him briefly after the service he told me that he regularly works very close to the church and always wanted to see inside and attend a service. I told him he would be welcome at our services any time! That very same Sunday, as the back door of the church remained open for ventilation, I saw a man standing in the gravel churchyard looking in. He was only visible to me. He remained there for the full duration of the service, and it was obvious that he was watching and following everything which he could hear outside. At times he was deep in prayer. At the end of the service, I gave the blessing. At this he bowed acknowledging that worship was over. Once I got to the door he was gone and so I never met him. However, it reminded me of the importance of sacred space and the visible presence of worship in the local community. I hope that man was blessed by what he heard and saw that day.

I began my sermon by asking, is it right to spend money on church buildings? I concluded with the following caveat. 'If the church building is a place where people genuinely meet with God, where individuals and families can journey together in faith, where the stranger and those on the margins find a welcome, where people can experience, to some extent, heaven on earth – the answer is a resounding yes!'

The Canon Packham Hall

As you all know, the Canon Packham Hall has been closed for all parish activities since March of last year. The only exception to this was its use by St Luke's National School as an overflow venue for certain classes and activities, as well as being a store for the surplus school furniture which had to be removed to make the classrooms Covid compliant. At the time of writing, we are still awaiting clear guidance from the government and health authorities regarding the

resumption of indoor meetings, events and activities. The firm hope is that, when it is possible and all the necessary cleaning, ventilation, as well as health and safety requirements are put in place, the Hall will be open again, subject to certain conditions. The Canon Packham Hall Committee, under the chairmanship of Uwe Schiller, will be issuing an invitation to all users to explain the new procedures when we have clarity on this matter. It is important that at least one representative from all organisations which use the premises attend this meeting. The Parish Office will be notifying people regarding this meeting in the near future.

To prepare for reopening, a number of maintenance issues have been attended to over the summer. These include clearing blocked drains, repainting the exterior woodwork as well as some of the masonry, repairing damaged gutters and lead flashing on the flat roof extension, internal repairs to doors, kitchen cupboards as well as other general maintenance. I want to thank the Hall Committee who have overseen this work and indeed have done some of it themselves to cut down on costs. Those involved include Uwe Schiller, John French, Tom Chambers, David Shine, Ivan Johnston and John Sweetnam. We are very grateful to them.



Recent Baptisms


The resumption of baptisms at our Sunday morning services is an important step back towards normality. Here
