#### The Rector writes.....

I begin my letter this month with a good news announcement! I am delighted to inform you that I have nominated the **Revd Jean Carney** to be my next curate, and the Bishop has approved this nomination. After a gap of a couple of years, it will be good to have a full-time ordained colleague in the parish and a new clerical resident at 64 Willowbank in Blackrock.

Jean comes to us with considerable experience of life and ministry. She has been a primary school teacher for many years, as well as being a Diocesan Reader in Limerick and Killaloe Diocese. She has spent the past year of her studies as a deacon working in the parish of Cloughjordan while she completed her master's degree in theology. Elsewhere in this newsletter she will introduce herself. Suffice to say, I am delighted that Jean will be joining the ministry team here in Douglas Union with Frankfield, and we assure her of a warm welcome when she is ordained as priest later this year.

Another good news announcement is that on Sunday 12 June, **Dr Richard Scriven**, one of our parishioners from Blackrock, will be licensed by the Bishop as a Diocesan Reader to serve in this parish. We are delighted that Richard, a former churchwarden and currently a member of the school Board of Management in St Michael's Blackrock, is taking this next step in his ministry. Richard's academic background includes a doctorate in the geography and spirituality of pilgrimage. We hope many parishioners will join him in St Fin Barre's Cathedral as he marks this significant step on his Christian pilgrimage. The service is at 3.30 that day and all are most welcome to attend.

This month begins with one of the most important festivals in the church calendar – **Pentecost**. On this Sunday each year we recall the dramatic outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the first disciples equipping them for mission and ministry. That same Holy Spirit is working in the world today calling people to proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ in what they do, by how they live and in what they say. For some, this involves a formal commitment to some form of recognised ministry in the Church. Ordination is for some and being a Diocesan Reader leading worship is for others. I am leaving information leaflets in all four of our churches explaining what is involved in training for Ordained Local Ministry and as a Diocesan Reader. Please take them and read them if you are interested in exploring this a little further.

However, all of us have gifts given to us by God. What are your strengths? How can you serve? One area of ministry that is vitally important is working with children and young people. We need people who will show how the Christian faith is something relevant to all ages. We need people who will run youth activities and volunteer to teach at Sunday School. Is this something you have a passion for? If so, please talk to me.

# Looking back...

First of all, a very big thank you for the beautiful bouquet of flowers presented to me by churchwarden Leslie Deane in St Luke's last Sunday. My birthday celebrations have gone on for nearly three weeks at this stage! Thank you also to Adrian for his kind words, so much appreciated at this time when my position within the parish and the diocese is changing. But I'm not going anywhere in a hurry! I am thankful that my work here will continue with few obvious changes for a while yet. Leading worship on Sundays, meeting and getting to know the rich variety of people in our parish, visiting in your own homes, especially those unable to get out and about, supporting people in difficult times and joining in fun events in the parish – in summary being part of the parish team - are all tremendous privileges – thank you. You enable me to discover and fulfil my vocation as a priest.

When I started in the Autumn of 2007, Adrian suggested that I should take on a project to be my own. He offered me several choices and the one that appealed was to set up some system of praying for those who are ill or in other difficulties – a healer prayer group. From our discussions emerged the Parish Prayer Chain, and we put out a call for those interested. Six people volunteered; I met with them and, there were seven of us, and seven days in a week! So each day one of us prays for all those who request it. Sadly three of the original group have since died. We give thanks to God for their faithful service, (others have joined) and for the faithfulness of our present band of prayers.

It is a particular privilege to pray for others. Archbishop Justin Welby has said: "Prayer moves us closer not only to God, but to one another...Prayer breaks down division, In prayer we take each other's hands and find our safe stronghold."

William Shakespeare, Sonnet 18

Shall I compare thee to a summer's day? Thou art more lovely and more temperate: Rough winds do shake the darling buds of May And summer's lease hath all too short a date: Sometimes too hot the eye of heaven shines, And often is his gold complexion dimm'd, And every fair from fair sometimes declines, By chance or natures changing course untrimm'd: But thy eternal summer shall not fade, Nor lose possession of that fair thou owest, Nor shall death brag thou wandrest in his shade, When in eternal lines to time thou growest, So long as men can breathe or eyes can see So long lives this, and this gives life to thee.



This is a love song written for an unknown mystery lady in Shakespeare's life but, as with much of his writing, it has a double meaning. The passage of time, or accident or sickness can veil the beauty that captured him and the memory of her beauty will not fade, even after she has passed away.

We can easily apply these timeless thoughts to our own experiences today.
